#### WCW NRA High Power Matches April / May 2014

The volunteer correspondent for submitting match reports to the newsletter has been slacking. It could be a writer's block though I'll use the excuse of having a late April match date made for a short or non-existent window to make the publication deadline.

Typically the matches are held on the 3<sup>rd</sup> Sunday of the month from March to October. This year it was me who instigated the changes for April and June. In April, we went with the 4<sup>th</sup> Sunday as not to have the match on Easter Sunday and in June, the schedule is for the 4<sup>th</sup> Sunday as well to avoid having a match on Father's Day. No doubt some would opine that a Father's Day match is fine if that is what Dad wishes to do or if you're not a Dad – who cares. Having been married to the same woman for 35 years and as a father, I can tell you that at least for me it doesn't seem to work that way.

Moving on, suffice it to say, this is a twofer report, April and May.

In spite of a well intentioned effort to miss Easter Sunday, the April match had a very light turn out with just 5 participants. Our resident High Master was at a match in Spokane leaving the field wide open for the mere mortals to rise for the occasion. The match was exclusively service rifles with most being on the AR platform. One participant was using a World War 2 era M-1 Garand. Robert Shuey is zeroing in on Master Classification fired a very hot 474 – 11X and in the absence of the High Master was anointed as the match winner.

Participation in the May match was a little better with 7 participants. Even though we elected to go with 2 relays, we still finished the match in pretty short order. Certainly not beyond 2 PM. Jeff McGee, High Master back from Spokane, using an AR platform match rifle was the match winner with 489 – 15X. The remaining 6 were all in the Service Rifle category, all AR platforms save one vintage 1903. Fuzhou Hu, now properly attired in his new Creedmoor Coat, was number 1 in the Service Rifle Group, having fired a 466 – 8X. With the understandable exception of the 1903 the remaining Service Rifle field had scores well beyond 400. The competition is warming, right along with the coming summer months.

Many thanks to our volunteers that do all the admin work to make the matches possible. There is more that goes on than just watching over the trigger pulling. Tasks include, registration, fee collection, target assignment, completion of range waivers for non-members, completing the NRA match report, setting up the range, conducting the safety briefing along with actual conduct of the match followed by filling all the required paper work.

### Kenmore Range Benchrest Matches

Benchrest Match Report, May 2014

Benchrest shooters in the Northwest are lucky (most of the time). It doesn't rain as much as people think it does out here and even if it does we don't usually have a tornado attached to it. And it's not cold, I mean, Minnesota-cold, for many days of the year. Admit it or not, we live in a benchresters paradise. The second Saturday of May was a good example. The temperature was in the high 50s, maybe low 60s. Rain was just a short drizzle. What's not to like. Oh yeah, almost no wind either. In other words a perfect day for a shooting match. At 8:30 there were only five shooters but just before the match was to commence, three more shooters arrived, all contenders in our factory rifle category. Customized hunting rifle would maybe be a better description of the rifles that were pulled out of gun cases. One was a most formidable weapon, namely a 7mm Winchester short magnum, with muzzle brake and sitting in a very nice Stiller custom action.

So how did the shooting go? We shoot two targets at 300 yards, ten shots each and then the same at 200 yards. There must have been some conditions affecting flight of bullet since no one shot a clean target in the first match. Ted Larson came closest scoring 99-0X. Mark Walker was right behind with 98-1X and Rick Graham was third with 97-1X. In the "factory" class Kevin Kellogg shot an excellent score of 97-1X, Lee Corley (he with the big 7mm) scored 83-0X and Vladimir Petrus shooting a .308 Win. scored 79-0X. In match two Mark was first with 100-2X, Rick was second with 100-1X and Ted third with 99 but shooting 4X. In factory Kevin again shot a 97 but with 2X, Vladimir bounced back with a nice 88-0X and Lee repeated his score of 83-0X. Okay, let's move the targets up close: two hundred yards. Ted shot a beautiful target in the first game, namely a score of 100-

4X, Mark was close behind but trailing in the "X" category (100-0X) and Rick Graham scored 99-3X. In factory class Kevin, Mr. Consistency, scored another 97 but with 0X, Lee began improving his scores with a nice 88-0X. Vladimir discovered that his scope mount was loose and had to fix that and save his ammo for match four. (It's amazing he shot as well as he did in the first two matches.) In match four Mark finally bested Ted but not by much. Mark had the best target of the day, a beautiful 100-6X, Ted was right behind with one less X and Rick also shot a 100 but with 2X. Over in bay two, with the late arriving factory boys, Kevin almost cleaned the target with good score of 99-2X, Lee broke into the 90s with 90-0X and the good natured young man, Vladimir, scored 84-0X.

In custom class Ted accumulated the most points proving that a well-tuned 30BR chambered rifle is a formidable gun for this type of score shooting. In factory Kevin pretty much walked away with all the marbles, often coming close to or equaling the score of the custom guns with his 6.5 Creedmoor Savage, albeit with a custom barrel from Benchmark. Great shooting Ted and Kevin! Kevin, most people think you should have yourself a custom bench gun built. You could put some serious hurt onto those guys, especially if you opted for a 30 BR. Just saying.

Our next match is June 14, so plenty of time to practice. In June we're going to try a new way of scoring. Instead of an "X" count plus number score we'll score 11 point for an "X", so the scores will simply be a number. If this method of scoring appears to favor a sweet shooting .30 caliber we may be tempted to switch back to our old system, but with the approval of the shooters, we'll give it a try. Some of the winners in today's match would have been different with this 11-point-X type of scoring.

The first Monday of each month is the Shotgun Committee meeting starting at 7PM. I attempt to keep the meeting to 30 minutes to allow for maximum shooting time.

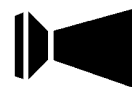
