## Rimfire Benchrest Rifle Match

Rimfire Match Report for January 2019 Effective with the November 2018 match, the United States Bench Rest (USBR) 50-yard rimfire target will be used. Each target contains 25 two-inch diameter bulls plus three sighter bulls. The scoring system is based on where the bullet touches the inner edge of the ring of the bull with one shot per bull. Each of the rings is .125 inches wide beyond the .1-inch center bullseye so even a fractional miss can adversely affect the shooters score. "X" s will be recorded and used for tiebreakers only.

The competitors are separated into two divisions, Match for rifles designed for

match competitions typically costing \$700 or more like those manufactured by Anschutz and Sport for rifles designed for target and sport shooting like those manufactured by Ruger, Savage, and CZ.

The entry fee is \$10 with two dollars per shooter for target expenses and the balance distributed in prize money. Competitors may enter rifles in both divisions with a \$10 entry fee required for each rifle. For complete match details see the February 2nd calendar event.

Match Division competitors will shoot both targets beginning at 9:01am with a 40-minute time limit. Sport Division competitors will shoot immediately afterwards starting at about 10:15 and need to register by 9:45am.

Each of the two targets will have standalone results and cash awards so those competitors who don't shoot well on the first target have another opportunity to finish in the money.

Shooters may use either a bipod or bags to support their rifle stocks and rear rest bags are also allowed.

Wind flags will be set up prior to the beginning of the match.

To be eligible for one of three season ending trophy spots, the competitor is required to complete a minimum of 16 targets.

In this month's match there were nine competitors in the Match Division and 14 in the Sport Division. Welcome to newcomers Jonathan Bizga and Eric Wang.

The new format of shooting by rifle division ran very smoothly for the 23 contestants which is a new record for participation.

In Relay 1 Match Division, Kevin Kellogg was the winner with a score of 243 3X. David Wild placed second at 239 6X with Brian Lapinski finishing third place with a score of 237 3X, competing for the first time in the Match Division. In the Sport Division, newcomer Eric Wang and Galen Guyer tied for first with a score of 222 1X. Darren Hoffman finished third at 214 3X. Because there were more than 11 participants in the Sport Division, fourth place money was awarded with Brian La-

pinski who also shot in the Match Division and David Konkle both shooting a score of 214 1X.

In Relay 2 Match Division, David Wild placed first with a score of 241 4X. Brian Lapinski again was in the money with his new match rifle with a score of 238 4X and Kevin Kellogg placing third with a score of 238 but losing on the tie breaker with only 3X. In the Sport Division, Keith Wilson finished first at 222 1X. Brian Lapinski finished second at 219 3X, cashing on all four targets in the Match and Sport Divisions. Mark Helzen finished third with a score of 218 5X and newcomer Eric Wang was in the money again with a fourth place score of 213 1X.

The scores are posted under the Events tab on the range website.

#### Guest Topics:

Youth Shooting Day in August - presented by Michael Craig  
Children are the future. Youth shooting sports are alive and well in other parts of the country. Michael presented ideas for the August Youth Initiative. We need to start a planning committee in Jan/Feb. We should have some of the WCW young people who currently participate at events present ideas to the committee on how to reach other young people. We should consider taking out an ad in the WAC GunNews magazine. We have local support from law enforcement and fire fighters. We should cut off registration by June 30<sup>th</sup> so we have enough time to reconcile the number of participants to the number of needed volunteers and identify the volunteers. Jeff L. suggested we hold the event in early June instead of August to increase participation and not to compete with summer vacations. Joe R. suggested we be mindful of when we do it.

#### Shotgun Report:

There was nothing new to report since the last meeting.

#### Operations Manager Report:

Mark Silver presented the operations manager report. Someone mentioned the battery in the safety light needs to be replaced. Mark said he would take care of that and create a maintenance check for the batteries going forward. Mark also mentioned the RSO classes are available to the public and members.

#### Corresponding Secretary Report:

Ping Look presented the operations report directly to the recording secretary and was not discussed in detail at the meeting. 16.94% of the newsletter recipients read the newsletter (1293 sent and 219 read). There were 10 new and 129 renewals online memberships. At the time of the board meeting, Ping had not received the numbers from new/renewing memberships that were submitted on paper.

#### Old Business:

We missed the rains storms from the previous day but there was a strong breeze throughout the morning. There were four new shooters participating in this month's match, Bryan Schremp, Bruce Teel, Mark Walker, and Bryan Zolinkov. There were seven contestants in the Factory Class and four in the Custom Class conducted at 300 yards.

Match one in Custom Class: Nguyen Khanh shot a score of 99 with Tom Horne and Parker Letson tied for second at 96 with Bryan Zolinkov in fourth at 95. In the Factory Class, Jeff Locke, shot 98 using an AR15. Ernie Snyder was second with a 96 using at Savage 204 Ruger, and Brian Schremp in third with a score of 93 with a Ruger 6.5 Creedmoor.

Match 2: Tom Horne and Bryan Zolinkov both shot scores in of 101 with Khanh Nguyen placing third with a score of 98. Tom's score allowed him to tie Khanh for the lead. In factory, Jeff and Ernie both had scores of 93 with Bryan Shremp third at 88.

Match 3: Tom Horne once again broke the hundred point barrier in difficult wind conditions with a score of 102 with Khanh one point behind at 101 and Parker Letson in third with a score of 99. In the Factory Class, Ernie shot another 96 moving into the third round lead over Jeff Locke who shot a 92. Bryan Schremp was third with a score of 91.

Last match: Tom Horne had a one point lead going into the final match and finished first again with a score of 99. Khanh was second with a score of 98 and Bryan Zolinkov with a score of 96. In the Factory Class, Ernie Snyder shot his third 96 of the match to finish first again. Jeff Locke was second at 88 and Dennis Tyskiewicz third at 87.

Usually, I do not write a high power article for the newsletter at the beginning of the year as we don't conduct a match in January. With the beginning of this year I am inspired to provide this submission.

If you will look at the various bulletin boards at Range 1, the Range Office, the Pistol Range and the Club House – you will see the CMP and NRA Bulletins for 2019. For 2019, I have committed to having a match the 2nd Sunday of every month with a few exceptions.  
 January 2019 – No Match as previously mentioned  
 May 2019 – The First Sunday as not to conflict with Mother's Day  
 June 2019 – No Match – more on that to follow below  
 July 2019 – The First Sunday as not to conflict with archery tournaments

The plan is to conduct a CMP Game for the months of February, March, October, November and December and to conduct Approved NRA Matches for April, May, July, August and September. A total of 10 matches for the year.

The rifle committee is conducting research for other opportunities to have either a CMP or a NRA Rimfire match. More to follow when the research is completed.

So why not June match? – Look to the bulletin boards for an answer though here's the reveal just in case you miss it –  
 June 8-9, there is a CMP Small Arms Firing School within range (Portland) at the Douglas Ridge Rifle Club. This is a rare opportunity that shouldn't be missed as it is the first time that I know of that the CMP has conducted a SAFS on the left coast. More information can be had from the posters that I have on the bulletin boards or by visiting the CMP Website and the Douglas Ridge Rifle Club Website.

2019 brings changes to the CMP Games Rule book, so far there hasn't been any changes to the NRA rules, though likely they will be coming to stay in sync with the CMP. Check the CMP Website for in depth details though the short story is Rule 2.6 provides accommodation to Competitors with Medical Conditions or Impairments and Rule 5.2.5 now includes a new "Unlimited Modern Military Rifle" class. Last, Annex G the Achievement Award Score table has been revised.

- C. \$5 fee


